Introduction

Pastoral Communities are reflective of the movement toward greater collaboration between parishes in planning and providing for spiritual, sacramental and pastoral needs within their respective communities.

Pastoral Communities enable neighbouring parishes to share personnel, resources and skills to enable parishes to do better together what they cannot do alone. Ballymena Parish is represented within the Pastoral Community by Monsignor Delargy and members of the Ballymena Parish Pastoral Council.

Ballymena Parish Pastoral Council

In accordance with the Norms for Parish Pastoral Councils in the Diocese of Down and Connor, the All Saints' Parish Pastoral Council has **a consultative role only**. Members of the Council serve a three-year term but can be re-appointed. The Parish Pastoral Council meets monthly between September and June each year.

Reflections on the 2019/20 Year

Building a joyful Community

The family became the focus of the celebration of our 10am Sunday morning Mass in All Saints. Our young people became actively involved in the celebration of the Mass



through the formation of two new choirs: a children's choir for ages 4 to 10; and a youth choir for children and young people in Year 7 and post-primary education. As members of the Children's Liturgy team, our older teenagers helped our younger children to understand and celebrate the liturgy in a fun way through art, prayer and conversation.

Nurturing the gifts of all the people

Lection Divina is a method of prayerful reading, contemplation and reflection on



scripture. A Lectio Divina group for Parish readers was formed in November 2019 and continues to meet monthly, and a second group will meet for the first time in January 2021. If you would be interested in joining a Lectio Divina group, please contact Jackie Kerr on 07483 875761.

Parish Readers perform a vital Ministry within the Parish, proclaiming the Word of God to our fellow parishioners at Mass, and to those joining the service from home by radio or webcam.

Training for current and new Ministers of the Word was held in November 2019 through a three-week programme delivered by **Kieran Downey**, Head of Religious Education in St Killian's College.

The laity can play an important role in the church and in the design and delivery of

services. In November 2019, a lay-led *Walk of Light and Witness* took place when families from the Parish came together in All Saints Church to listen to a short reading from scripture before setting off on a walk wearing brightly coloured clothing and carrying glow sticks. The walkers were led by the Children's Choir. While the walk was taking place, the Luminous Mysteries were recited in the church.



Understanding our faith

DRUMALIS Pathways Adult Faith **Development Course**

The Parish actively promotes the Pathways programme delivered by Drumalis each year. Pathways is a two-year Adult Faith Development programme suitable for men and women of all ages who wish to update their understanding of Church teaching, faith and ministry and to explore what this means in everyday life. Three parishioners commenced Year 1 and six parishioners commenced Year 2 of the programme in 2019.

> The Pathways programme is currently suspended but the Council is keen to promote and sustain involvement in the programme when the current Covid-19 restrictions end.

A programme of talks, prayer and reflection entitled *Giving God* Another Chance and arranged by Frank and Maeve Magee commenced in January 2020. Guest speakers included Deacon Terence Butcher, Rev Desi Maxwell and former Tyrone football manager, Mickey Harte.

Evangelising/Sharing the Good News

Communication and engagement are key priorities for the Parish Council. The Parish Facebook page and website have been critical in the sharing of key information and

staying connected as a Parish during the Covid-19 pandemic, particularly when the churches have been closed. The Parish Facebook page has played a vital role in the broadcasting of Masses and services since March, enhanced further by the installation of webcam technology in the summer months. The Parish Pastoral Council wishes to record its thanks to Phoebe McDonald and Dermot



Crawford for their management of the Parish Facebook page. December 2020 also saw the launch of the new, vibrant Parish website designed by Brian Wilson.

Deacon Joseph Baxter

Deacon Joseph Baxter visited the Parish in November 2020 and spoke about the Permanent Diaconate at each Mass on the Feast of Christ the King. The Permanent Diaconate responds to the call of Jesus and his Church in three specific ways. These are through the Ministry of Charity serving the poor, vulnerable and marginalised, the



Ministry of the Word proclaiming the Gospel, and the Ministry of the Altar assisting the Bishop or priest at Mass, distributing Holy Communion, celebrating baptisms, officiating at weddings or assisting at funerals. Deacon Baxter encouraged men in the Parish to contemplate a vocation to the Permanent Diaconate as a third group of students will commence their studies in September 2021. In February 2020, the Council welcomed **Roisin O'Hara**, Outreach Officer with Trocaire, who gave an overview of the Pope's Encyclical *Laudato Si, Care for our Common Home*. The Council has had a specific focus on eco-issues in 2020. The Parish has registered as an eco-Parish with the inter-denominational Eco-Congregation Ireland and is supporting the Crebilly Garden Project led by **Donna McCormick**.

The Crebilly Garden Project project involves planting and maintenance of the grounds of St Patrick's church in Crebilly. Donna will be seeking further volunteers to get involved in the Spring, so look out for details in the Parish bulletin, Facebook page and website.

Covid-19



We could not reflect on the 2020 year without recognising the impact of Covid-19 on our Parish community. The celebration of the Easter Triduum in an empty church brought an intensity, simplicity and spiritual significance to Holy Week and Easter Sunday services that will be long remembered.

While churches remained closed in early May, the annual May Novena was broadcast daily via Facebook with talks and recitation of the Rosary taking place each evening from 1 to 9 May 2020.



From the outset of this health emergency, our Parishioners and Parish Groups responded with compassion and generosity to support those in need and our front-line health care workers. The manager of the Old School Café in our Parish Centre, **Claire Law**, worked with SVP and All Saints GAC to prepare and distribute frozen meals to



parishioners who were socially isolating. SVP also worked with the Carson Project in Harryville and Mid and East Antrim Council to distribute food parcels as part of a crosscommunity response to Covid-19. Parish groups and volunteers worked to make scrubs and masks for health care staff.

It was with great joy that we were able to re-open All Saints Church for private prayer

on 24 May and public Mass in early July, and able to re-open St Patrick's Church, Crebilly in August. This again illustrated the incredible generosity and spirit of our parishioners with teams of volunteers acting as stewards to prepare the churches for reopening, distributing passes, cleaning the church, and ensuring that social distancing measures were in place and observed. We also saw the re-opening of the Parish Centre, providing safe, socially distanced meeting spaces for Parish and community groups, and the re-opening of the Vincent's SVP charity shop.





Working with our Parish primary schools, the Sacrament of First Holy Communion was celebrated over three weekends in late September and early October, with around 150 children making their First Holy Communion.
